Molino Park Elementary School has been designated as a pet-friendly shelter for household cats and dogs. Space is limited, and available on a first-come, first-served basis. Pet owners are required to stay in the adjacent American Red Cross shelter and are expected to care for their own pets. Pre-registration is required for pets and their owners who anticipate using the shelter. Licensed service animals are permitted at all public shelters.

“Animals Inside” Rescue Stickers



Some emergencies, like house fires, occur with no warning. What will happen if you are not home to evacuate your animals or are unable to reach them? Make sure your home is visibly marked as a pet home. “Animal

Inside” Rescue Stickers include the number and types of pets inside, known medical needs, and veterinarian information.

It is common for frightened pets to hide, even from their owners. Rescue Stickers will help emergency responders ensure that all of your animals have been rescued before moving on to other houses in need.

National Disaster Animal Rescue Team (NDART)

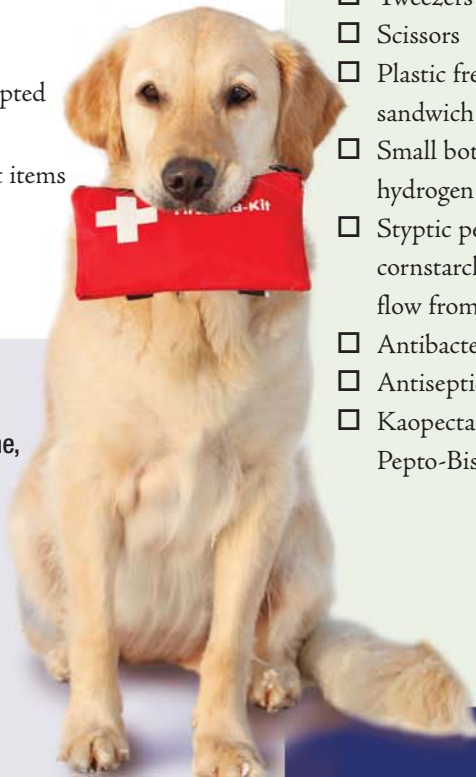
Pet Emergency Check List



“The first 72 are on you.”

If you evacuate, take your pets with you.

- Pet First Aid Kit
- Food and water supply to last 72 hours (dry food and pop-top cans)
- Photos of your pets or microchip for identification in case of separation
- Litter, litter tray and scoop
- Food/water bowls
- Extra leashes/collars
- Pet carrier for each animal
- Flashlight
- Blanket or towels
- Copy of up-to-date medical records
- Copy of pet prescriptions
- Map to location where pets are accepted (shelter, hotel)
- Toys, beds, etc. that are personal pet items from home
- Cleaning supplies
- ID tags attached to each pet



Riding It Out at Home

If you plan to ride out the disaster at home, never leave your pet unattended. Bring pets inside immediately. Put your emergency kit in a safe, accessible location. Make sure startled pets cannot escape. Separate dogs and cats. Stay clear of windows, fireplaces and appliances. Keep pets out of the kitchen.
